
- Young Adult Writing is NOT "Dumbed Down" Adult Writing
- *Hot / Serious Topics
- Don't Water Down the Truth

- *What's important to teens?
 - Friends and Meaningful Relationships
 - What Other People Think About Them
 - A Sense of Self
 - Grades / School
 - Their Future

- Harry Potter's Struggles:
 - Making Friends
 - Fitting in the "right" House
 - Discovering his hidden potential
 - Surviving wizard school
 - Saving the world from Voldemort





Provide the audience interesting ideas, settings, and scenarios




- *Keep in mind, kids buys books, adults buy MORE books
 - Need to sell concepts to parents and teachers
 - •What are topics are adults comfortable with exposing to their kids

- Schools
 - Focus on learning
 - *Historical topics
 - Science/Technology







- Taboos
 - Sex
 - Nudity
 - Vulgarity
 - Excessive Violence
 - Drug use

•All Taboos CAN
be addressed –
go light on the
descriptions

- Don't get preachy, just tell your story
 - Trust your audience will get it



- Satisfying endings
 - Doesn't have to be happy, but it should be hopeful
 - A better life is coming
 - *Characters have changed (character arc)


- Remember to Hook Your Audience
 - *Overarching story huge and epic (sounds good)
 - *The core of your story deep and character-centric

Teen Hooks

- Dystopian
- Starkly realistic
- Stories that challenge their world view
- Push the limits of what's acceptable

*Tween Hooks

- Funny, adventurous
- Similar activities of reader
- Bordering on unbelievable premises



- Select the character(s) to match your audience
 - Same age or slightly older
 - Similar problems / desires / wants
 - Avoid stereotypes

- Point of View
 - *NO RETROSPECTIVE WRITING No adult wisdom
 - *Allow kid characters to make kid mistakes
 - Thoughts and reactions should be appropriate for what your character knows / understands

- Voice
 - Select genuine voice for your character(s), each should be unique
 - Characters themselves may be searching for their voice
 - Speak differently amongst their friends vs adults

- *Fully developed characters
 - •Tell something NEW about your main characters in EVERY scene
 - •Allow readers to become friends with the characters
 - Show multiple sides to each character

•Character example:

- Bruce, he plays football
- Big and bullish-looking
- Loves dogs and wants to be a vet
- Struggles with math, but takes Honors Algebra because a girl he likes in the class
- Obsessed with eating pickles
- Has a neighbor with Down's syndrome who he gives piggy-backs rides
- He cried when saw the Fox and the Hound



- *Types of kids haven't changed
- Environments, situations, technologies
 have changed DRAMATICALLY
 - *Kids have changed to adapt

- Understanding of Technology
 - •What do kids know, and what don't they know?
- Terminology
 - Use the CORRECT terms in the CORRECT context




- Basic Desires of Teens (13-19):
 - Sense of identity, self
 - Meaningful relationships, beyond childhood friends
 - Gain confidence in adult responsibilities
 - Question what they've learned
 - Start to take ownership of their own lives

- Basic Desires of Tweens (10-12):
 - Cares what adults think of them
 - They start to challenge authority
 - Don't want adults around
 - They still need love/support
 - Activities (games or sports) more important than hygiene
 - Embarrassment, fitting in
 - Want to do grown up things

- What do kids generally don't worry about?
 - Paying bills
 - Carrying for others' welfare
 - Cooking dinners
 - Managing carpools/transportation
 - Next day consequences
 - Their own mortality

 Propel your story with the concerns of your audience

- Main character, Jonas, has lived a cookie-cutter life
- He has a moment of enlightenment
- He decides to live his own life, away from his family
- He rebels, breaks the rules, and leaves



- *Teens React: The Hunger Games (01:50 onward)
 - *How real they view the story
 - *How they relate it to their lives
 - *How they understand the symbology
 - Their general reactions
